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Dear Friends,

Word came earlier this week that a long-time member of my home church, Trinity Presbyterian of Dallas, had died. Then, word came that the former Associate Pastor of that church, who served during my growing-up years, was now under hospice care at the end of his struggle with a form of leukemia.



Images of both of those men immediately sprung to mind, along with particular ways they influenced my faith journey. Tom will always be to me the father of Eric, my church friend who died by suicide at age 13. But even more than that, I hear his booming baritone voice welcoming all of us to Vacation Bible School with song. With an infectious smile and boundless energy he made sure that every child knew that she or he had a place in that church and knew that we were beloved. Tom and his wife established a scholarship fund in their son's memory, and I remember their delight in informing me that I was the initial recipient of those funds.

Chuck, the Associate Pastor at Trinity, was responsible for youth ministries. Youth ministry in any era is a challenge, but the late 60's and early 70's was particularly rough. We were a rowdy, defiant bunch! To this day, I feel a twinge of guilt for some of what we put Chuck through, even as he continued to care for us. He didn't preach often, but one moment plays in my memory. During the sermon, Chuck told a story about coming upon a homeless man crawling inside a dumpster looking for food. As he told that story, he looked at us in the congregation and said with righteous indignation, "Eating from a dumpster!" and began to weep.

Jesus Christ, through the church and its people, shapes and changes lives. Tom lived a life of gratitude, generosity, and hope even as he carried the pain of losing a son every day for the rest of his life. Chuck practiced unconditional love for some hard-to-love teenagers and called us to let our hearts be broken by the injustices of this world. They, and so many other imperfect, broken sinners in the church, set me on a path that I walk to this day, praying that I can somehow be a part of welcoming the lost and uncertain, testifying to hope when things seem hopeless, weeping with others over so much that is wrong and banding together as God's instruments trying to make things right.

That is who we are as a church. That's what we do. Even on days when our weaknesses, pettiness, and failures are most glaring, I'm grateful for all the saints who have gone before, who journey with me now, and who call Jesus' church "home."

Called By Name

In the Old Testament, names are important. We read about the naming of Adam and Eve, the careful curation of each creature's names and changing names of Abraham and Sarah to Abram and Sarai. In our world today, names are still important. Your parents took great care to come up with your full name. Even the Louisville zoo cares greatly about naming the animals. When the zoo welcomes a new baby animal that has been born into the zoo community, there is a significance placed on naming the animal. For the past couple of months, the city of Louisville has been thinking of names and talking about what to name the new baby elephant who was born in late summer. Isaiah 43:1 says: "But now, says the Lord, the one who created you, Jacob, the one who formed you, Israel: 'Don't fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name; you are mine.'" This verse about God calling and claiming the people of God indicates the love, care, and the closeness of God's relationship to the people of Israel. Sometimes, we think a name is so simple. Each one of us has a name, some of us might have multiple names as we may have



nicknames. When someone calls you by your name or even your nickname, it makes you feel known. Can you imagine a baptism where Pastor Nathan and Pastor Steve baptize the baby without saying the child's name? Saying a name during baptism is a sign that he or she belongs and is loved.

On October 20, we went to the fall festival at Bellewood. I saw a youth who I have seen the past few times I've been out there. I called him by his name and asked if he wanted to play one of the games we took out there. Without answering my question, he told me his exciting news and updated me on his life. I had to wonder, if I had not called him by his name, would he have still told me his exciting news? Our youth go to Bellewood the third Sunday of each month to play games or do crafts with the kids. And each time I am out there, I try to learn every kid's name that is there with us that day. I honestly do not know if it makes a difference to them, but it changes the way I interact with the kids. It creates an intention to get to know the kids, and it creates awareness in myself when people call me by name. When God calls each and every one of us by name, how will you respond?

Mission Update: A Note from Dr. Bob, Women's Global Cancer Alliance

Thank you and all involved for welcoming us as a Mission of the Month. We are honored to have been selected. I personally thank everyone for my warm welcome each Sunday in October and for your generous support of the Women's Global Cancer Alliance (WGCA).

Our final figures indicate that the members of Second Presbyterian Church responded to the Mission Invitation by donating \$3,640 to the WGCA. This will allow us to conduct 121 screenings to detect pre-cancer of the cervix. This is so important for the women of Gonaives, Haiti. It's the only way they have to detect gynecologic cancers.

We gratefully thank the members of the congregation for their generous support.

Bella interviewed him for a report she was writing on a refugee or immigrant for an AP Human Geography class. He was very helpful, and she learned much about his background and his dreams for the future.

As progressive educators, one of the attributes we highly value is intrinsic motivation. It is the force inside each of us, driven by interest, that propels us toward deeper learning, achievement of goals and new levels of understanding. We have seen it recently in the Infant-Toddler program, as the infants explored frozen peas in a Ziploc bag filled with water, determined to

grasp, move and smash the small legumes. The teachers did not tell the babies, "You must explore the peas!", nor were they offered a tasty treat to entice them over to the bag on the light table. Instead, the teachers created a lovely invitation of the materials that naturally engaged

the curiosity and interest of the infants which roused their intrinsic motivation to interact with them. If you stop to watch and listen, you can see this internal drive in action everyday in children. Above, Frankie walked over to the tire ladder on the playground and placed a foot on it. Her face was set and she looked up to begin her climb. She did not want help; she was motivated to engage in the productive struggle of getting her small but mighty body to the top. When Frankie reached her apex, she stood with a giant smile on her face, looked down at the ground, and then at me, exclaiming, "I did it!" She beautifully demonstrated intrinsic motivation with its natural partners, persistence and determination.



Another example of a child's interest leading them to achieving new learning is from the Silver Room. Wynnie watched Estelle carefully build a tall tower with black blocks. After Estelle had stacked as many



as she could, she let Wynnie knock it over and then use the blocks herself. Wynnie slowly, silently and purposely placed block after block,

exhibiting such self-control and attention. Finally, she put the last one on top and her face immediately changed from focused to joyous as she saw what

she had accomplished. Her interest, motivation and openness to taking a risk yielded pride, achievement and new skills and knowledge! Estelle played a major part in Wynnie's learning, too: she was what Lev Vygotsky called the "more knowledgeable other," and served as a mentor for her friend. We help each other leap to new levels of development, too.

When children and adults have a high interest in a topic, they automatically invest more thought, time and energy into learning about it, and this allows deeper levels of knowledge and understanding. At Second Pres, we strive to naturally evoke this intrinsic motivation in children by offering a wide array of open-ended materials, new experiences and thoughtful challenges. We also observe and listen to the children, noticing where their interests lie. It is from that starting point that teachers can facilitate their students' learning through dynamic, interdisciplinary and collaborative projects. Projects allow a classroom to build knowledge together, learning from and teaching one another as they gain new skills and expand their thinking, individually and collectively, along the way. By honoring intrinsic motivation, we, as educators, are also reinforcing children's natural learning behaviors and encouraging them to continue being curious and bold lifelong learners as they grow. This will also come in handy when they bump up against a tricky math problem or a conflict with a buddy as they get older: they will know that if they want to find a solution, they will because they have had the experience of doing it so many times before in their lives.

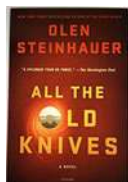

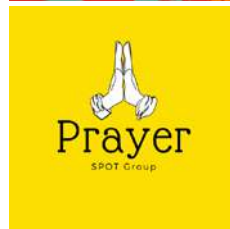

Big Window 1 person (1/2- 1 hour)

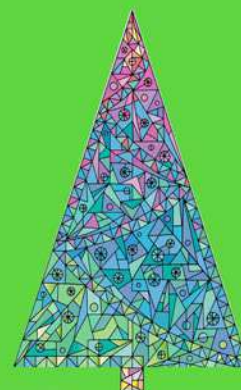
Sconces 2 people (1 hour)

Poinsettia baskets in the Sanctuary can be picked up at the church after the 11 p.m. Christmas Eve service.

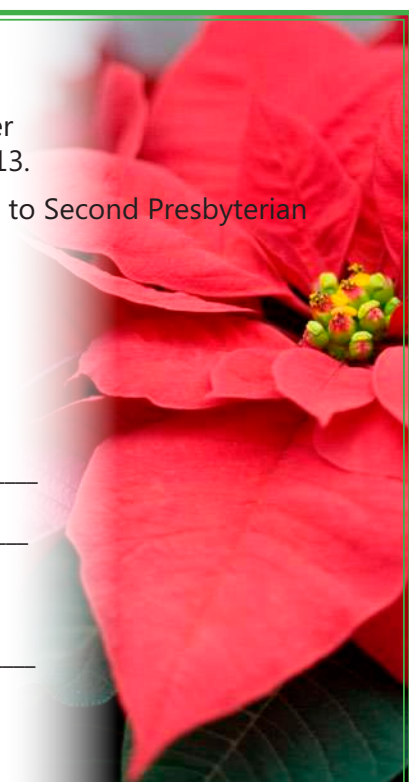
