Dear Friends,

By the time you read this, we will have been through what may be the most unusual Christmas in any of our lives. But despite the anxieties and fears, the disappointments and sadness over separations, Christmas came. We heard the story again, maybe with fresh ears. I know I did. Because a church friend sent me



some thoughts and materials on angels, I began to notice how much these "messengers" from God permeate Luke's story of events leading to Jesus' birth and the birth itself. Angels are everywhere in movies, television programs, art and books related to Christmas. It was a Christmas tradition for Diana, David, and me to find an angel calendar for my mom.

What is it about angels that grabs out attention and populates the imaginations of even those who are indifferent to the reality of God? Perhaps it's the reassurance that we aren't alone in the struggles of life, after all. Perhaps it's the suggestion that there's something beyond ourselves out there. Perhaps it's the relief that comes from the possibility that there is more to life that we can see, hear, touch, or measure – that something called "mystery." Or maybe it is simply that many of us enjoy the beauty of these winged creatures as imagined by creative and gifted artists through the ages.

There's something flashy, even exotic, about angels. But when we get down to basics, the word for "angel" in Greek simply means "messenger." For the most part, in Scripture, angels are those who convey the will, purpose, and words of God to oftentimes frightened and always surprised humans. Though we tend to domesticate angels, make them friendly and accessible, in the Bible they are most often intruders into how things are, those who speak a word that wakes us up and shakes us up. Those "favored" by angel visitation, like Mary, often aren't exactly thrilled and comforted by their presence.

As we turn the page to 2021, we need angel visitations that comfort and reassure, that challenge and disturb us. If nothing else, life in 2020 has awakened us profoundly to what matters most and what doesn't, to what needs to change in our lives, the church, and the wider world. This past year has reinforced our need for something beyond our own strength and wisdom, for an infusion of mystery into the mundane. The fact is, what we need most, what we long for most deeply, isn't dependent on the visitation of those "sweetly singing o'er the plains," but is offered in the one to whom they witness, Jesus the child of Bethlehem. In him, God promises never to leave us alone, God holds out the great mystery of the holy entering into everyday human life, God challenges us with the truth that love is the only thing that matters and that love will be victorious.

Jesus usually isn't flashy or exotic. In fact, it's easy to miss his presence, to not hear his voice. But still he comes, still he speaks, and still he knocks on the door of our lives. Will we let him in?

Samuel (Sam) Libra

as Organist beginning January 1, 2021. After a national and regional search for our open half-time position, we are honored to welcome Sam to the music ministry staff and the family of Second Presbyterian!

Sam comes to us from Seattle where he has most recently served as Associate Cathedral Organist for St. James Cathedral. He holds a doctorate in organ performance with emphasis in music theory at the University of Washington in Seattle as a student of Carole Terry. His research focuses on symphonic and keyboard music of 19th-century France and Belgium. In 2016, he had the opportunity to travel to France for a summer course of study with Jean-Baptiste Robin at the Royaumont Foundation.

Sam received his Master of Music degree in organ performance with emphases in sacred music and music history from the University of Washington, and his Bachelor of Arts degree in music, with emphases in organ performance and church music from Luther College in Decorah, IA. He proudly credits his Lutheran upbringing for his understanding of church music and ministry. Sam has served in a variety of capacities at churches in the Seattle area, including as administrator and director of children's, handbell, and adult choral groups, and as coordinator of concert programs and recitals.

In addition to his service to the church and his studies, Samuel has given performances at a number of churches throughout the Puget Sound region, and frequently enjoyed collaborative performances, playing harpsichord and organ in cantatas and chamber works with the University of Washington Baroque Ensemble. He also had the opportunity to collaborate with a variety of Pacific Northwest ensembles, including the Cathedral Chamber Orchestra and Cantorei, Seattle Bach Choir, Seattle Choral Company, reSound: A Northwest Chamber Ensemble, the Sammamish Symphony, and the Seattle Youth Symphony Orchestra.

Samuel is an active member of the American Guild of Organists and Organ Historical Society, having been a Biggs Fellow at the latter's 2017 convention. For the AGO, he is formerly Member-at-Large of the Seattle Chapter board, and presented several programs on various topics at their events. He also served as Deputy Convention Coordinator for the upcoming 2022 AGO national convention in Seattle.

Please pray for Sam and Dylan who are settling into their home in Louisville, and in these days of acclimation to our city and the life of Second. His first Sunday to lead us at the organ is January 3.


2PY Christmas Party

News from Our Refugee Family

Happy New Year, friends! Our family from Afghanistan is quickly becoming part of our community. We hope all of you at Second Presbyterian Church can meet them in 2021.

The Amiris will receive their green cards in short order. Their Special Immigration Visas qualify them for rapid processing. Amiri worked with US military personnel for 15 years in at a military base in Afghanistan.

A Zoom meeting on December 4 with Maha and interpreter Kadija Shojae from Kentucky Refugee Ministries (KRM) introduced all the Refugee Team to our new friends. We learned about their family history and about their long journey to safety in the U.S. The family is from Jalalabad, Afghanistan, on the Pakistani border. Amiri worked at Jalal Abad Airport, currently used as a U.S. military base. He moved incoming supplies from arriving planes and was experienced in forklift operation, equipment

maintenance, and radio communication. His English is very good and he is anxious to integrate his family into our community. His lovely wife Katul is pregnant and due in May. She and the rest of the family have had medical checkups and are well. The three daughters are delightful! Bibi is 8, Anosha is almost 6, and Hanasa is 2. Bibi has had some school experience, but it was religious instruction as they are Muslim. The girls will need help with reading. The Amiris have large families still in Afghanistan.

Sarah and John Hunter graciously donated a 2004 full-sized Chevrolet van to the family. Negotiations are ongoing to transfer the van at the appropriate time. Amiri will soon take his driver's tests in English. Many thanks, Sarah and John! We were pleased to have you join us in the Zoom meeting!

Thanksgiving dinners were delivered to the Amiris and to our first large Congolese family from 2018. Holly Gathright took a Cracker Barrel dinner with all the trimmings



to the Amiris and they were excited to have a big turkey dinner! Martha Spencer took a turkey and sides to Genereuse, Immaculee, and Judith . Those enterprising young ladies went to YouTube for cooking instructions and produced a yummy looking meal!

All our refugees from 2018, 2019 and 2020 are well and growing in Louisville. Thank you, Second, for your faithful love and support in these sponsorships. Our new neighbors are a vital part of Louisville.

Second Presbyterian's Response to Hurricane Iota

Hurricane Iota hit Nicaragua on November 14 as a category 5 hurricane.

The Mission Committee has chosen to respond to this crisis by providing \$5,000 to Accion Medica Cristiana (AMC), a Nicaraguan, faith-based non-profit organization that is established in Nicaragua.

A report by Tracey King-Ortega, PC USA Mission Coworker based in Nicaragua:

AMC has been working for over 36 years to strengthen capacity in remote, impoverished communities

of Nicaragua in community health, food security and disaster preparedness and mitigation. With an ongoing presence in the North Autonomous Caribbean Region, AMC is uniquely positioned to respond to the aftermath of Hurricane Eta with immediate food aid and medicines and later on with rebuilding and replanting. AMC works with all stakeholders; among them government institutions, other NGOs, and most importantly, the trained community health leaders that help identify needs and deliver support in response.





Join One of Our Grief Groups

Traditionally, when we think of grief, we think of the feelings of loss, anger, and denial we have when someone close to us has died. Session Highlights from December 17, 2020

At the December 17, 2020 stated Session meeting held over Zoom:


- Session received the Clerk's Report, the Minister's Report, the Deacons' Report, the Financial Report and various other monthly Committee Reports;
- The Finance Committee reported that Second continues to operate at a deficit in November. It is hoped that December giving will be strong and that Second will finish in a good financial position. Receipt of outstanding pledges is the only way to avoid a deficit at year end.
- The fulfillment of pledges and gifts to the Covid-19 Fund demonstrates the amazing generosity of our congregation. The Covid-19 Fund has recently received additional gifts totaling \$105,000.
- Cabbage Patch giving for the year was \$28,000, exceeding the goal of \$20,000.
- The 2021 MAP was approved by the Session.
 The MAP for 2021 projects a small increase in expenses coupled with uncertain income levels leading to a potential deficit for 2021.

- The Mission Committee gave Session an introduction to PCUSA's Matthew 25 mission initiative. Session plans to research the tenants behind the initiative more before voting on adopting the initiative in January. The details of the initiative can be found at presbyterianmission. org/ministries/matthew-25/
- The Youth Committee reported on their efforts to consistently engage with the youth of the church during the pandemic.
- The Worship Committee proposed and Session accepted dates for Communion in 2021.
- The Reopening Task Group will meet in January to assess the possibility of in-person worship; and
- The Annual Meeting of the Congregation was scheduled for January 31, 2021.
