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Our Mission

Sharing the grace of God with one another and the world around us.

He goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice (John 15:4).

Dear Friends,

I don't know a thing about sheep or shepherding. The only experience I've had with sheep has been in petting zoos when David was little and when Diana and I stayed at a B&B in Scotland that was on a working farm with dozens of sheep.



But I do know that the Bible is filled with

references to sheep and shepherds, with sheep as metaphor for the lost and wandering people of Israel and shepherds as metaphor for human rulers, God, and Jesus himself. "The Lord is my shepherd," famously begins Psalm 23. Last Sunday Jordan preached from the tenth chapter of John in which Jesus declares, "I am the good (model) shepherd."

As one commentator points out, it was the case in Palestine that the shepherd went ahead of the sheep, calling to them by name to keep them moving, alert to dangers on the way. It is my understanding that in places such as Europe and Great Britain, the practice is for the shepherd to follow the sheep, driving them forward, keeping a watchful eye on what is going on ahead within, and just ahead of, the flock.

Both approaches have their strengths, it seems, but they have one thing in common. In the Palestinian version of shepherding, the sheep can see the shepherd, but from a distance, and only from behind. They can't see what's ahead beyond the shepherd. In the European version, the sheep can't see the shepherd at all, aren't sure what's ahead but keep moving forward in trust, listening for the familiar sound of the shepherd's voice. In both instances, the sheep journey along an uncertain path, trusting that the shepherd wants them to be well and safe, listening intently for the shepherd's voice.

In my faith journey right now, the image of the shepherd leading from behind is a powerful one. In a time of tremendous upheaval and change, sensing the call to be faithful to Jesus in new ways, I struggle to see Jesus clearly ahead of me or to rest assured that he's clearing the path of danger and leading me to familiar, still waters. Instead, he is the sure presence urging me forward, a sure presence I cannot see, the faithful one calling to me, encouraging me, giving direction. My job is to listen for that voice above all others.

I believe the same is true for Second Presbyterian Church and, perhaps, for you in your journey. The way ahead is not obvious. Familiar landmarks and road signs may not be as helpful as they used to be. We may be tempted to quit moving, lie down, and stay put. The promise that guides us, the promise to which we cling, is that the risen Lord Jesus has our backs, is keeping a watchful eye upon us, and still speaks to us, lovingly calling us by name. We know his voice. Will we listen for it?

We are still requiring reservations for our 11 a.m. Service of the Lord's Day in the Sanctuary. Reservations open the Monday prior, and close the Thursday prior to each Sunday. The 11 a.m. Service will continue to be live-streamed. Our church staff and Re-opening Task Force have reviewed the guidelines set by our Session, the Mid-Kentucky Presbytery's recommendations, and current CDC and state advice in making the decision. We will be following all the current protocols including required reservations for in-person services, properly wearing masks, and spacing 6 feet or more. Per the recommendations of the Presbytery and CDC, we will continue to discourage singing in the Sanctuary.

weekday school Outdoor Education Nodes

Our outdoor nodes (places of interest around our campus) change with the seasons, offering new intrigue for our students. A 3s class took the "Secret Passage" to the Nature Trail in early April, taking their time as they explored the surprise they found there: springtime flowers. The children began touching, smelling and collecting the little purple flowers to give to each other, their teachers and their parents. Their teachers encouraged them to look closely at the flowers like scientists and artists, noticing the details in the petals and leaves. "I see stripes!" one child exclaimed. When they spied a whole section of yellow flowers, a student pointed and shouted to her friends, "Look! More yellow flowers over here!" Several children ran together to pick them and sit on the hill, spending time together exploring and collecting more flowers. One student found some things that did not seem to match the rest of the environment: an old, rusted flag, a large aluminum can, a plastic carry-out bag and a toy bird. The child's face was indignant, and she called to her teacher, "Ms. Meg! Come here and

see!" as she pointed to an offending piece of trash. One of her classmates told her, "That's litter." Some students decided to gather the trash to throw away while others tested the "steep" hill, running up and down, assessing their risk by slowing down when their legs took on too much speed. They heard birdsong, warily eyed bees and lit up with excitement as they spotted butterflies. At the end of this nature walk, the class visited Miss Mary in the Fairy Tree. She was there, waiting, and one child left a small violet with her as a gift. Within these 20 minutes of outdoor exploration, the Green Room students demonstrated compassion, curiosity, stewardship, kindness, adventure and healthy risk assessment. They bonded even more as a classroom community through the experience, and from that joyful place, freely gave love to the land and others. As children engage positively with each other and the environment, their desire to connect with and care for living things is reinforced



Senior Recognition Sunday





Mission Update

This past month the Mission Committee began studying together our understanding of Mission as partnership in the Missio Dei or the "Mission of God" the idea that God is a missionary God. We will continue thinking theologically about this and how it might impact our work with our mission partners. We will also begin exploring where else God might be calling us to partner in our local community and how we can deepen our relationships with our current mission partners.

The Committee took action to send Covid-19 Emergency Relief funds to our partners in Costa Rica and El Salvador who have been particularly hard hit with the pandemic and several tropical storms this past year. We sent \$3,000 each to both the Latin American Biblical University (UBL) in Costa Rica to buy more equipment to expand online learning and to the Reformed Church (IRCES) in El Salvador for mental health counseling outreach within the communities they work. In our next meeting we expect to hear from other Mission partners who are concerned about declines in their fundraising and opportunities to help with summer programming with other partners.

We are so grateful to the faithful and generous response from the congregation to our Mission of the Month for Buckhorn Children's Home! Several members of the committee took those items to Buckhorn in late April to visit the children and get an update on the care and ministry there.

We are grateful for all the ways we as a congregation are able to share God's grace with the world around us through your generosity each and every month!

You Made a Difference!



The March Mission of the Month was Buckhorn Children and Family Services. Buckhorn is one of our longstanding mission partners located in eastern Kentucky offering a variety of therapeutic services for children in the community. Children referred to Buckhorn's programs are survivors of chronic and frequently severe abuse and neglect. They are children from families that suffer from drug addiction, domestic violence, poverty, and a lack of education and parenting skills. They are challenged with mental disorders, developmental delays, and educational shortfalls. Many of them have faced the unimaginable and often come to Buckhorn after a number of failed placements or when no other residential treatment program in the state has the capacity to accept them.

A central service provided by Buckhorn is the Campus-Based Residential Treatment Program serving boys and girls ages 13-17. In March, 2PY collected items such as small toys and treats and assembled 16 Easter bags for each teenage girl residing at Buckhorn. In addition, the Second Pres congregation collected a large quantity of needed supplies for Buckhorn. These supplies were delivered by some of the members of the Mission Committee: Larry Sloan and Ed McShane. Thank you to all for your generous support of this important mission partner meeting important needs in eastern Kentucky!




Book Notes
