



Dear Friends,

There are stories we love to tell, again and again, and stories we love to hear, again and again. There are stories that, despite the frequent re-telling, don't seem to lose their richness and impact on our lives. It could be the story of how you met your spouse, what it felt like to see your child come into the world, the overwhelming sense that God was present in that particular place or relationship or struggle, the transforming experience of being with someone beloved in their last days or moments. Those kinds of stories tell us and others where we come from, what we value, what shapes us and gives us identity.



For me, one such story is the story of what happened last Christmas Eve at Second Presbyterian Church. We were about nine months into the pandemic, struggling with finding ways to connect with each other in meaningful ways. Many of us were mourning the loss of Christmas traditions and gatherings. I must admit that as a church staff we were feeling disheartened, facing the probability of preaching, playing, praying, and singing to an otherwise empty sanctuary. We pondered various options, none satisfactory, until we stumbled upon the idea of an outdoor Christmas Eve service in the area between the Chapel and the library.

It was bitterly cold and windy as the sun began to set with a few snowflakes gently settling to the ground. People began to arrive, and they kept coming. Some 160 eventually showed up to hear the familiar story, hear (and quietly sing) the familiar songs, to raise a candle and wipe away a tear during "Silent Night." We were together as best we could be, united by the story of a God who loves us so profoundly as to be born among us as one of us. The story of the God who comes to us as a vulnerable infant is one we never seem to tire of hearing.

We'll tell the story again this Christmas Eve, sharing the Good News with friends in the pews and friends online. I expect we'll be a lot more comfortable—at least warmer!—this year. This story of Emmanuel, "God with us," defines us as, again and again, we tell it, hear it, and live it out in our lives for the sake of God's beloved children who long for "heavenly peace." A blessed Christmas to you all!

Children





Zooming In: A Look at Some of Our Educational Influences

Education is not preparation for life; education is life itself. - John Dewey

As progressive educators, there are several educational psychologists, theorists and leaders in child development who we look to as experts in the field. They are people who closely observed children, watching their play and documenting their learning. They also noted what external and internal stimuli affected their happiness, learning and focus, and what gave them purpose. Some of these people who inform our philosophy and pedagogy at 2nd Pres began their work in the 1800s, such as John Dewey. He promoted and tested his dreams for educational reformation through "progressive" schools from 1898-1916. He believed that a child was not an empty vessel to be filled up by the learned, but a person fully designed to make connections through an active, constructive and reflective process. Like Maria Montessori, who said, "What the hand does the mind remembers," Dewey believed *doing* naturally yields *thinking* which results in *learning*. This is why, at 2nd Pres, we put such emphasis on providing hands-on and real life experiences for our students.



What a child can do today with assistance, she will be able to do by herself tomorrow. -Lev Vygotsky

Lev Vygotsky is another of our educational heroes. Hailing from the early 1900s in Russia, he observed children carefully, finding that they continue to progress in development and understanding in social contexts with just enough help and encouragement. He gave us the term "Zone of Proximal Development," which means that people of all ages can reach their next stage of development in any area with a "more knowledgeable other" providing the right amount of scaffolding to help them make the leap. We view teachers as facilitators of learning who closely watch, listen and assess their students to offer the right amount of support and challenge for children to move to the next level of development. Since we teach to the whole child, this means we scaffold social/emotional, physical, cognitive, creative, and language development.

We see and honor children as intelligent, capable and competent individuals who can be the "more knowledgeable other". Like teachers, they can help their friends learn something new, as well. Our blended classrooms are founded on this principle where the older children serve as mentors and leaders to their younger classmates. This is also

why we invite productive struggle, the practice, space and time a child needs to hone a new skill. We honor children's ideas, interests and theories and see them as important, driving components of curriculum. They influence the materials we put out, the topics we investigate and the direction of classroom inquiry. Together, the teachers and children build their understanding of the world together. Loris Malaguzzi, cofounder of one of our greatest educational inspirations, the early childhood schools in Reggio Emilia, Italy, described it as this: "Learning and teaching should not stand on opposite banks and watch the river flow by; instead, they should embark together on a journey down the water. Through an active, reciprocal exchange, teaching can strengthen learning how to learn."



Are we forming children who are only capable of learning what is already known? Or should we try to develop creative and innovative minds, capable of discovery from the preschool age on, throughout life? -Jean Piaget

Lastly, Jean Piaget, a Swiss clinical psychologist from the 20th century has given us his detailed theory of the stages of cognitive development children follow through maturity if nurtured and enriched. Physicians, educators and psychologists refer to his work to this day. He became an educational theorist who believed that education was the answer to social reform and the continuation of progress in the world. Piaget wholeheartedly argued that the development of the mind through experience, investigation, discovery and invention is the way to live fully in the world and be an agent of change in it. And for a child, this comes back to play. Through play and active engagement with materials and others, children begin to discover the world, make sense of it and form understanding. Our Infant/Toddler, Preschool and Kindergarten programs at 2nd Pres promote this, and we are always striving to fulfill it in more meaningful and effective ways. Your children are powerful already, and we, as their teachers, work at being facilitators of their research of the world.

Kentucky refugee Ministries (KRM) has welcomed 79 Aghan individuals, 23 of whom arrived this past week. They have secured and furnished apartments for all. In addition, KRM continues to welcome refugees from other corners of the world and Cuban clients. All of these arrivals, an unprecedented number, have been covered by 2nd and other Louisville Presbyterian churches, PCUSA other denominations, Louisville synagogues and the River Road Mosque. It has been a tremendous interfaith effort to meet the current need.

All six Abdulkarims arrived November 9th, exhausted yet thrilled to be welcomed by 2nd Pres members and friends. The family is quarantined in their apartment, awaiting Covid vaccines. Medical visits are happening this week. Our team is communicating via phone and text and have dropped off a few loads of groceries along with coats, shoes, hats, scarves and gloves for every family member. Maha, the KRM case worker for the family, is deeply grateful for our help with medical calls and advocacy for the Abdulkarim during this time.

Many thanks to many of you who rushed to donate both new and gently used warm winter wear. When we drove up once to drop off food, they all came rushing out of their apartment decked out in full winter gear. Looks like it will take a while for them to acclimate to our cold weather!

The 21-22 Horizons Bible study "What My Grandmothers Taught Me" by Merryl Blair explores the women in the lineage of Jesus. The title of Lesson 4 is "Ruth and Loyal Love". The Book of Ruth begins "In the days when the Judges ruled" and "there was a famine in the land." Naomi and her husband, along with their two sons, flee Bethlehem and become refugees in a foreign land. In time, Naomi is widowed and left to raise her two sons, alone. Her sons marry local women, Orpah and Ruth, who become widows, as well. When Naomi hears news that the Lord has lifted the famine, she decides to return home. She tells her daughters-in-law to go back to the homes of their mothers. Orpah accepts Naomi's reasoning, but Ruth follows Naomi. She demonstrates her loyal love, hesed, to Naomi with the promises "Where your go, I will go; where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God shall be my God." On their return, Ruth gleans a field owned by Boaz. Boaz offers Ruth food and water. He commends her for her actions adding, "May the Lord reward you for your deeds, and may you have a full reward from the Lord, the God of Israel, under whose wings you have come for refuge." Ruth praises Boaz for bestowing his loyal love, hesed, upon her.

Hope & Healing While Grieving

Speaker: Jason Chesney, M.D., PhD.

Chief Administrative Officer /Director of U of L Brown Cancer Center

Dr. Chesney is currently conducting new clinical trials of a novel cellular immunotherapy called Tumor Infiltrating Lymphocytes (TILs) for the treatment of melanoma, lung, cervical and head and neck cancers.

Arriving in Louisville in 2003, Chesney has already made a significant impact at the Brown Cancer Center. He has developed new cancer therapy, now in use across the nation, authored 98 peer-review research articles and secured more than \$30m dollars in philanthropic funds and grants to advance cancer research.

Active in professional organizations, Dr. Chesney is a member of the American Association for Cancer Research, the American Society of Clinical Oncology and recently completed a four-year commitment as a standing member of the National Cancer Institute's Tumor Cell Biology Study Section. He was named the Brinkley Endowed Chair in Lung Cancer Research in 2015 and the James Graham Brown Foundation Endowed Chair in 2017.

He lives in Louisville with his wife, Dr. Alden Klarer, who is a radiation oncologist and their children.
