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Dear friends,

I recently came across a quotation that spoke to my heart: "The only real sadness, the only real failure, the only great tragedy in life, is not to become a saint."

We Presbyterians understand "saint" in different terms than someone who stands out as more pious, more faithful, than others. We believe that every baptized person is a saint, a member of the household of God, part of the great "communion of saints," believers both living and dead. We also believe that the heart of the Christian life isn't striving to achieve a kind of spiritual perfection, but responding in gratitude to the God who reaches out in acceptance to sinners like us. Nevertheless, I believe that reflection is a word to all of us who seek to follow Jesus.


The Lenten season and, indeed, this post-pandemic era—hopefully!—fosters asking the big questions of ourselves and our church. One of the most prominent, asked in various ways, is "What does it look like to be successful as a disciple and as a church?" And a related question is "What does it look like to be a failure as a disciple and as a church?" Following the norms and values of our culture, we're likely to answer that success is being a decent person, being active in the life of the church, and being a caring and responsible person. A successful church is one that grows in numbers and participation, has plenty of money to fund its life and mission, is active in outreach to the community and world, and provides a welcoming and positive "vibe" that is contagious. Failure is the opposite of such results.

Numbers can be important and point us to important truths. Results can help us to discern our priorities. Financial resources can be a great gift and tool for ministry. Joy and gratitude are at the heart of discipleship. I'm taken, however, and challenged by the conviction of that long-ago disciple that the only real failure is the failure to strive for excellence as a disciple and as a community of faith. The only real tragedy is to settle for less as a church and as a Christian. The truly sad reality is when we waste the gifts we've been given—or never even discern those gifts—and leave ministry up to those who are more "qualified."

What we're really talking about is the old notion in our tradition of "living into our baptism." It is the commitment, throughout our time on this earth, to become who we truly are: beloved and valuable children of God who, in gratitude, share in word and deed the message that others are also precious and beloved. Excellence in the life of faith is to live as Easter people, trusting that—by the power of the Spirit at work in fallible human beings—God brings life out of death, joy from sorrow, hope from despair.

We often settle for less as people and church, wary to claim our identity, to be more of who we're created and called to be, to keep our eyes focused on what used to be or the challenges of today rather than the "new thing" God is doing and calling us to be a part of. As we approach that great Day of Resurrection may we pray, "Lord, by your grace and in the power of your Spirit, how can I, and we, be excellent for you?"



Weekday School



Learning is happening constantly throughout the day in our classrooms, whether that be social, emotional, physical, creative or cognitive. Our teachers practice observation to notice the moments when that learning is happening. They then document it through anecdotal notes, photographs, work samples and more to inform their teaching and curriculum each week. But how do we make learning visible to others? How can we share the thinking, collaborating, creating and knowledge-building occurring in each classroom? One way is to use the documentation boards hanging on our hallway and atrium walls. In the photograph above, one of our 4s classrooms presented a large collaborative collage depicting what they have learned together about ocean life. If you spend a little time looking closely at it, you see many skills the 4s students used to create their collage. They have obviously explored ocean ecosystems through literature, photographs and discussions to be able to include sponge plants, plankton and red algae in their collaborative art piece! Their fine motor skills are on display, particularly their scissor work, through the carefully cut out shapes of the different species. The labels of each species' name were written with phonetic or "best guess" spelling, illuminating the children's budding awareness of letters, words and the English language in print.

Through viewing this documentation, the teachers' perspective can also be seen. Art and science were combined so naturally in this ocean project, demonstrating their understanding that a topic can be most deeply explored when students are provided many different experiences and lenses through which to consider it. The teachers also showcased the process of learning through the photographs on the sides. These pictures present how the ocean collage was created, as well as the thinking and skills each child used and practiced to produce it. The final product is a beautiful representation of all the learning and work leading up to its culmination. So, if you get a chance to visit our hallways, take a moment to pause and look closely at our documentation boards. They are all unique glimpses into the particular curiosity and interests of the children inside.

Emergency Aid for Ukraine

The current Russian invasion that started on February 24 follows eight years of conflict between Russia and Ukraine. Hundreds of thousands of people across the country are enduring bombings and assault by Russian military forces; and have lost power, been cut off from water and fuel. As people head toward the western regions, there is a shortage of food and other basic supplies.

In the midst of the chaos, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is working with sibling churches and ecumenical partners who are already providing assistance with basic items for survival. Initial assistance being provided includes shelter, food, clothing, blankets, baby food and diapers, other hygiene supplies, flashlights and candles, generators and fuel.

Our first priority is to provide funding to these partners on the ground. Our response to the situation in Ukraine will include both financial and technical assistance as the network of faith communities providing humanitarian assistance grows in the months ahead. The needs for the response will be great.

A message from The Cabbage Patch

Dear church partners,

We wanted to let you know ways that your mission investment in the children and families at The Patch is profoundly changing lives. We are most grateful for your faithful and generous support. Together we are able to accomplish extraordinary things. Here are a couple examples of how lives are being changed.



January provided The Patch with a very tumultuous month amongst ice storms, school closures, and two weeks of unexpected virtual instruction. It can be difficult for children to communicate how these changes are affecting them—instead it is shown in their behavior. Some of our teen members have resorted to unhealthy coping mechanisms due to the constant state of change in which we are currently living, including an increase in exmerimental recreational drug use outside of The Patch in some of of our members. To combat this behavior amongst our teens, we have been in communication with the Executive Director of the Kentucky Harm Reduction Coalition in order to potentially provide

future programming around the topics of substance abuse to supplement additional education for staff on recognizing the sings of drug abuse, and conversations with Teen Leaders and Teen Club around violence prevention and emotional wellness. By providing education and a safe outlet to have open discussions around these issues, we hope to see our teen population improve in these problem behaviors and seek healthier ways to cope.

We pray a prayer of protection and peace over our youth. We pray that we can work with them to understand the emotions and stressors that lead to unhealthy behaviors and provide a trusted place to learn healthy and positive ways to deal with them.

We have been seeing a trend the past year of more of our clients needing to work a full-time job plus an additional job on the side. One client works full-time in a medical office, plus evenings and weekends providing daycare to an adult with a developmental disability. Another client works full-time for Humana and then delivers groceries for Instacart in her spare time. Clients have benefited from our food pantry assistance as well as utilities assistance programs. Often, it is our assistance that helps keep them from falling into debt.

We pray a prayer of blessing and hope for our families who are struggling financially. We pray for their peace and their prosperity as we shine our light by helping to remove stumbling blocks along their journey to financial stability.

We give thanks to God for our mission partners that make our work possible, and communities like Second that who have supported us for so long.

Hello friends.

It's hard to believe, but our formal sponsorship of the Sudanese Abdulkarim family has ended. Three of the children are in school and the 4th child and father are seeking employment with the help of Kentucky Refugee Ministries. We are in the process of scheduling a meeting to help the family form a budget and streamline the bill paying process.

We also have some shocking news to report: our Afghan mother and daughter, Mohboba Akbari and Rika Anwari moved to California!

We had heard they wanted to move to be near relatives but were caught by surprise, as were our colleagues at KRM. This move was so sudden that this week's medical appointments had to be cancelled. Our interpreter managed to contact the ladies because staff at KRM needed the keys to the apartment, information regarding the contents of their apartment, as well as what to do about some bills. Before leaving, the ladies gave the contents of their apartment away to their Afghan neighbors. Many of you donated items and funds to furnish their apartment and clothe them and both Mohboba and Rika were overwhelmed by your kindness.

Our prayers now are for them to find comfort and peace as they begin a new life, so far removed from their immediate family who are still in hiding around Kabul. Life has been tragic for these ladies and we hope you will keep them in your heart and in your prayers.

Our refugee team would like to sponsor two more families in 2022, one in August and another in November. Until then, please accept our most sincere thanks for your most valuable support.

From our mission partner Cedar Ridge Camp: We have been incredibly blessed during this last two years of living with Covid. Like everyone else, we have been challenged to keep our doors open and to provide camping experiences for children.

During the 2020 and 2021 camping seasons, we were pleased to have a three-week Quarantine Camp, where we tested children twice upon arrival and then after everyone was deemed negative, we were able to unmask the kids and stay in a bubble on the Cedar Ridge Camp property. This was very effective in allowing us to have a traditional camping program without masks, and no one had Covid. It was such a delight to see campers, who had been in lockdown, suddenly able to be free to be "regular kids."

Part of our work here is to continue to improve the camp. To that end, we have been building a chapel. Despite slowdowns due to supply chain issues, we are happy with the progress. We hope to have the building under cover by the end of the year.

Second Presbyterian Church has been a wonderful partner in developing Cedar Ridge over the years. We are so thankful for your congregation's help in this Presbyterian ministry and mission to our community.

Session Highlights

From the March meeting:

- Confirmands Jack Blythe, Trevor Gilford, Charlie Lewis, Vivienne Linville, Robert Sartor, Nolan Williams, Anna Zimmerman, Hayden Delaney and Ceci Flowers were examined by Session on March 17th and were overwhelmingly recommended for membership at Second Presbyterian Church. They will be received into membership by profession of faith on Sunday, March 20, 2022.
- Financial Report—Highlights: Pledges for 2022 received in February were \$82k bringing total YTD 2022 pledge income to \$330k including pre-paid 2022 pledges at year end in 2021. This is ahead of the 2022 MAP and slightly ahead of the same period in 2021. Additionally, prior year 2021 pledges received in 2022 now total \$40k. Treasurer's Report: YTD income is \$48k higher than same period 2021 pledge income accounting treatment. YTD expenses are \$36k above same period 2021 due mainly to higher Mission spending offset by Personnel savings. Weekday School operations were reported for the 8 months ended 2/28/22 (fiscal year ends 6/30) with revenues of \$931k, expenses of \$791k, and a current surplus of \$139k.
- Rev. Jordan Akin will embark on an opportunity for continuing education and self-reflection in a week long CREDO program the week of March 21st.
- Traditional Communion will resume on April 3, 2022.
- A Session retreat is scheduled for April 22–23.
