Dear Friends,

A member of Second had a question for me about prayer. Why, she asked, do we focus our prayers, most of the time, on the painful situations in people's lives and in the world? She was quick to add that such prayer is certainly appropriate and necessary. But what about giving thanks, prayers of gratitude, expressions of joy? Her question is consistent with my experience, both personal and collective. It is easier for most of us to ask for help for ourselves and those we love or hurt for than it is to "give our thanks and praise," as the response puts it.

I took that experience with me to my next meeting with my spiritual director, a wise and faithful man with whom I meet monthly to discuss how God is present and speaking in my life. When I told him about the question from my church friend his eyes lit up and he enthusiastically suggested that a question like that is surely one of the ways God reaches out to us and speaks to us. We went on to unpack what gratitude is in our lives and how we express it. Then he said something that grabbed my attention. Gratitude, he said, is the anchor, the foundation, for prayer. Why? Because an "attitude of gratitude" means we acknowledge that the starting point for prayer isn't me and my needs, it isn't the way I think the world ought to work or how God should act. The starting point for prayer is that the God of Jesus Christ is a Giver, who showers grace upon us that isn't based on our deserving or undeserving. We are recipients of abundant gifts who simply respond with gratitude.

Not long ago I was talking with another church friend about how it seems harder for me at this point in my ministry to say "goodbye" to people I've formed a close relationship with and who, as is true for all of us, die. It isn't that I have serious doubts about their new life with God. It's just that I'm more aware of their absence, and maybe that's a reflection of my own awareness of mortality. This friend's response was another one of those moments where it appears God might be speaking. She said that part of her response to those losses was to celebrate and give thanks for the gift of having such persons in her life and for their witness that has touched and shaped her. Wow!

Gratitude is a gift we must pray for. It is also an attitude we can cultivate. Perhaps during your Lenten journey, you can focus first in prayer on the gifts of God, the joys and riches and deeply meaningful moments and beauty that come your way that you have done nothing to deserve and that you have not created through your own efforts. Be aware of the goodness that comes to you from the hand of God, even in difficult times, and in gratitude offer that same grace to someone who is hurting or lost. It can change the way you see God, yourself, and this world.



Zooming In: The Importance of Children's Books, Especially Those on Repeat! Hayley Abell, Director

Engaging with literature is an act of devouring for children. They study the illustrations, decipher the words that form the story, and follow the characters along their journeys. They also notice the smell and feel of the paper, how big the book is in their hands, if the pages are difficult to turn and where their favorite parts are located. They encounter these elements in a holistic way, experiencing books physically, emotionally and cognitively. Perhaps you can remember the books that especially captured your senses and mind at a very young age. My guess is you read them many times to the point you still carry pieces of them with you after all these years. Returning to the same stories is a natural part of child development when books are available. With each visit, children continue to discover new aspects of the books they are drawn to while deepening their familiarity and affection for them. Through this process, a well-worn book becomes a comfort, a friend, a safe place. Books can be tools for self-care and agency when children use them to self-soothe, create security or relate with others. When children ask their loved ones to read the same story again and again with them, they are establishing tradition and offering opportunities for connection. Through all this rereading, particularly of high-quality literature, children stretch and enrich their understanding of themselves, others and the world. Individually and collectively, we can give children time and space to immerse themselves in books, on their own and with others. As parents and teachers, it is a worthwhile endeavor to find those good stories that spark children's joy for reading and the illustrations that evoke wonder.

I have a strong connection with Gyo Fujikawa's book, Sleepy Time. Per my request, my parents reread this book to me during my first two to three years of life. I don't remember the moments when I took Sleepy Time to my parents and sat in their laps, being so young. However, I do remember returning to it when I could read independently a few years later. I came to the illustration of several children sleeping in lovely, snug beds and immediately recalled the question

that had seemed so important to ask at each reading when I was younger: Which sleeping child am I? While we continue this throughout our lives, representation in literature is very important for young children whose identity development starts with self and extends to family, friends, community and world. Gyo Fujikawa intentionally included babies and children of different ethnicities. She wanted the children who would open her books to feel welcomed and loved, having watched her Japanese



parents be discriminated against after World War II. With each rereading, not only did I have the opportunity to explore my own identity, I also had the chance to see children different from me. Like Gyo Fukikawa and many others, we can intentionally include stories with a variety of characters in our home and school libraries so our children see both themselves and others in the pages they turn.

And we can say yes, when possible, to rereading Goodnight Moon, Mike Mulligan & His Steam Shovel and Where the Wild Things Are for the 327th day in a row.


