Of freedom, freedom, freedom.


I hear a distant song: it fills the air.

A NOTE ABOUT THE MUSIC TODAY

John Rutter's beautiful *Distant Land* was composed in 1990 following the fall of the Berlin Wall and Nelson Mandela's release from prison. Although each stanza echoes "freedom," the poem reveals a longing for a deeper freedom found in peace and unity through recognition that, though we are many, we strive for a future in which we can all be one, as fellow children of God.

The postlude echoes a similar theme and is J.S. Bach's homage to the Trinity. Within the work, there are three separate sections that represent the three persons of God: the stately Father in heaven, the striding Son in ministry on earth, and ethereal Spirit, tying them together into one unified whole.

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

1 Holy, Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty!



Much of the imagery of this hymn comes from Revelation 4:2–11, which its author, an Anglican bishop, knew as a reading appointed for Trinity Sunday. The tune, written specifically for this text, reinforces the Trinitarian theme by strong dependence on the D-major triad.

- 5 Thou spread'st a table in my sight; thy unction grace bestoweth; and O what transport of delight from thy pure chalice floweth!
- 6 And so through all the length of days thy goodness faileth never; Good Shepherd, may I sing thy praise within thy house forever.

Since its creation in the mid-19th century, this text has been one of the favorite paraphrases of Psalm 23 in the English-speaking world. That popularity increased in the early 20th century when *The English Hymnal*, 1906, first joined these words to this flowing Irish melody.
