Dear Friends,

As I'm sure is true for many of you, I have memories of sitting down with a group of people to hammer out something called a "mission statement." The best ones are succinct, capturing the essence of an organization's purpose in a way that is easy to remember. One I often refer to is an old Domino's Pizza statement: "Fresh, hot pizza in twenty minutes or less." That says what they are about in a sentence. Often, though, mission statements are carefully crafted, then stuck on a shelf and mostly forgotten.

A couple of years ago one of our elders suggested it was time for strategic planning, thinking prayerfully about who we are as a church and where we're going. The process began with a series of meetings with the pastoral staff. Perceptions and observations were gathered and sent to session for extended discussion over a three-month period. The results were summarized and sent back to the pastoral staff. It became obvious that a broader group of conversation partners was needed, so a diverse task group was established, meeting several times. The result was a Vision Statement, a Mission Statement, and a Tag Line, approved by session.

Several clear emphases emerged from the conversations. Second makes establishing and nurturing relationships a priority. Second understands itself as a church that expresses its faith through significant connections with the wider community, working for the well-being of others. Second identifies itself as a welcoming place for people of diverse perspectives, experiences, and commitments while maintaining a unity that isn't uniformity. A summary word for all of this is "grace" – God's freely-given, unearned, and undeserved favor offered to us in Jesus that we, in gratitude and with God's help, offer to others.

We are rolling out the following statements in the coming months, including a sermon series in February exploring key aspects of the statements.

Vision Statement: We are a community of faith who, by the Holy Spirit, seeks to form, nurture, and strengthen relationships in order to share the grace of God in Jesus with the world around us.

Mission Statement: Sharing the grace of God with one another and the world around us.

Tag Line: Sharing grace.

I look forward to upcoming conversations and the ongoing journey of living into the encompassing reality of grace.

Welcome Jordan Akin, Associate Pastor for Youth

Jordan Akin was born and raised in Little Rock, Arkansas, where she grew up as a member of Second Presbyterian Church in Little Rock. She was a very active member of the youth group throughout school and served as a youth deacon.

After graduating from Hendrix College in 2014 with a B.A. in Religious Studies, Jordan became a Young Adult Volunteer (YAV), which is a year of service program through the PC(USA).

Her first year as a YAV was in Hollywood, California, working for People Assisting the Homeless (PATH). She then completed a second YAV year in Asheville, North Carolina, working at a YMCA conference center in Black Mountain. During the second half of her YAV year in Asheville, Jordan also served as an intern at Black Mountain Presbyterian Church, working with their youth group.

Jordan was the summer Seminary Intern at Second Presbyterian Church, Louisville, in 2017. She graduated from the Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, where she received a Masters of Divinity in May 2019. From May to August of 2019, Jordan worked as the Youth Intern at Second, and from August until January, 2020, she worked as the Interim Youth Director.

We are now happy to introduce her as Associate Pastor for Youth, following our membership's acceptance of her for that role at the January Congregational meeting.



News From Our Busy Refugees

Our 2018 and 2019 refugees have been busy integrating themselves into the community and working on their educations. What a determined bunch!

In December, Nedal faced a job loss as his company had financial challenges and had to remove several recent hires from the rolls. Nedal immediately started planning a remedy with KRM employment specialists and on January 6, he started an application process with UPS assisted by some of Second's own members. In the meantime, our Refugee Committee was able to offer him rental assistance made possible by your financial generosity! Checks and cash for our refugee fund have arrived steadily since his arrival, and it is nice to know that we have the ability to help when needed. He has since interviewed at UPS and was scheduled to start work January 27. Meanwhile, he is also busy with classes at Jefferson Community College.

Our Congolese ladies are thriving in every aspect of their lives and busy with college classes and work.

Genereuse had hoped to attend a Bible college but was unable to get as much financial aid as needed. She is now working on a business degree at JCC. Immaculee is also at JCC working on a degree. Judith is doing clinical training for dental work. They are also working at UPS, as are other family adults. Great news from Judith - she traveled to Rwanda for two months to marry her long-time fiancé, Tite! Their wedding took place on January 4 and a picture of the happy couple accompanies this article. They are planning to work with an immigration lawyer to start Tite's application to come to the US. This will be a long process, but they are willing to make the commitment. Eventually, they will join Judith's family for lives they have long planned.

Please think about all our refugees and offer prayers for their continued successful settlement in our country. We are fortunate to know them and to help establish future citizens as they add their talents and goals to the American dream.

the building of our collective and individual learning by sharing our knowledge, connections, questions and ideas. We are each a part of the teaching and learning taking place in our classrooms. Loris Malaguzzi, cofounder of the now famous Reggio Emilia early childhood schools in Italy, described it as this: "Learning and teaching should not stand on opposite banks and watch the river flow by; instead, they should embark together on a journey down the water. Through an active, reciprocal exchange, teaching can strengthen learning how to learn."

Lastly, John Piaget, a Swiss clinical psychologist turned educational theorist from the 1900s, wholeheartedly argued that the cultivation of the mind through experience, investigation, discovery, invention (and we would say, democracy, too) is the way to live fully in the world and be an agent of change in it. And for a child, this comes back to play and dynamic inquiry-based learning. Through play, projects and active

engagement with materials, peers and adults, children begin to discover the world, make sense of it, form understanding and interact with it more purposely. We strive for this at 2nd Pres and are always learning and growing in order to live out our philosophy in more meaningful and effective ways. We use what we have learned from those who have gone before us, as well as conduct our own teacher research about our children each day. Our teachers work at being their students' reflective guides and facilitators, supporting,

encouraging and challenging them as they cultivate new skills, build their understanding and continue to blossom as humans.



Most of us were brought up in traditional school settings, so the thought of a developmental, progressive education can feel like uncharted territory. Progressive education comes from the work and beliefs of many educational psychologists, theorists and leaders in child development. It was established by curious people who thought education could honor children's intelligence, capability and natural ways of learning, a step forward from schooling's purpose of creating future workers, as in the agrarian and industrial times. Some of these people we have learned from began their work in the 1800s, such as John Dewey, who believed that a child was not an empty vessel to be filled up by the learned, but a person fully designed to make connections that need only be drawn out through an active, constructive and reflective process. He believed doing naturally yielded thinking which resulted in learning. This is why, at 2nd Pres, we put such emphasis on providing hands-on, experiential learning for our students. Another important person in education, Maria Montessori, agreed with Dewey. She said, "What the hand does the mind remembers."

Lev Vygotsky was a Russian educational psychologist in the early 1900s who saw that community and collaboration were vital for cognitive development. His work demonstrated how humans reach new levels of learning in any area with a "more knowledgeable other" providing the right amount of scaffolding to help them make the leap. This gives us the role of teachers as facilitators of learning, striving to attend to the whole child, supporting not only our students' academic learning, but also their development as human beings. In our classrooms, we collaborate in




Book Notes
