In-Person Worship to Begin October 4

Second Presbyterian has been blessed over the past several months to offer consistent opportunities for worship, and study, and fellowship both online, and through careful planning and discernment, in person.

As approved through our Staff, Worship, and Property Task Groups, and shared with Session in August, we are preparing to open the church for worship on Sunday mornings, starting October 4, World Communion Sunday.

Our Morning Prayer Service at 9 a.m. will move from the inner courtyard to our Great Hall (gymnasium). You are invited to bring your comfortable outdoor chairs inside, and we will keep safe distancing as we have all summer. The same safety protocols will be followed for the service (masks, safe distancing for individuals and "pods," and we will not engage in congregational singing).

We will continue to livestream our 11 a.m. Service of the Lord's Day on our YouTube channel, but will open the Sanctuary to the congregation by a reservation system. We will again follow all CDC guidelines including the requirement to wear masks and not engage in congregational singing.

Our committees and staff are working diligently to construct the safest plan for us to be together on Sundays, and once these guidelines are finalized, we will send out a church-wide mailing.

Praise be to God that we can continue lifting our hearts to God in worship! We pray we can see you soon.

Guidelines for Use of Church Building

Second Presbyterian Church is allowing committees and other small groups to meet on site if they so choose. The following stipulations apply:

- The group leader must schedule the meeting ahead of time with Pastoral Assistant Lisa Bickett at (502) 895-3483, ext. 218.
- Meetings will be held in Rooms 251, 252, and Fellowship Hall.
- Gatherings will be staggered so as not to place undue burdens on our cleaning staff.
- Each group will have an identified leader/contact person, and that information will be given to Lisa Bickett when the reservation is made.
- Number of occupants for each room is dependent on current social distancing orders. That figure will fluctuate according to current conditions.
- Participants will enter through door #2, the "office door" facing Walgreen's, and will exit through the same door at the end of the meeting.
- Upon entering, participants will wear a mask, have their temperature taken by the group leader (device provided by the church), and register their attendance.



weekday school



Considering the big, overarching history of our planet, from its creation all the way to the modern world, we get a bit of an antidote to all of the uncertainty we are currently facing: change is a constant. I mean, Kentucky used to be under water, believe it or not. If you visit Falls of the Ohio State Park, you will see aquatic fossils in the limestone providing a glimpse into a much different state than we know now. Change can take place over many years, like our country's struggle for racial equality. It can also happen in minutes, such as when a baby goes from hungry to nourished and contented. Some things in our lives we wish would never change, while others can't move on quickly enough (2020). Regardless, weather, seasons, architecture, fashion, ecosystems, conflict, technology, politics, friendships, music - not to mention our own bodies, thoughts and feelings - all shift and change over time.

Change is our settling principle as we enter into this new school year. We can step into what will be an unpredictable ride with the grounding knowledge that we will not always be in a pandemic. We will not always have to wear masks out in public, bump elbows instead of hug, awkwardly walk around people to give six feet of distance, stockpile toilet paper or limit the number of friends and family with whom we come in contact. There will be a time when the flow of life has normal-sized, not corona-sized, interruptions again.

We also know that with change comes change. Representatives from the Board, administration, staff and parent community have collaborated this summer to intentionally put in place health and safety protocols and procedures to ensure the well-being for our students, families and staff. This year will look different for all of us. For example, in order to accommodate the groups of

10 requirement, our teachers for ages 3 and 4-year-old and Kindergarten have moved from co-teaching to lead teaching with assistants for this year. They will plan as age-level teams, staying in close collaboration with each other on developmental milestones and goals while also honoring the autonomy of their classrooms. Another example is that we are planning on being outside as much as possible, not only for the health benefits of sun, fresh air and space, but also to purposefully encourage children in building connections with nature.

The thing with change is that it causes us to adapt and evolve, and that is what we are doing to meet the challenges set forth by the pandemic. There are some constants at play in conjunction with change, though. Our philosophy, built on the understanding that children learn through doing, moving, connecting, playing and interacting remains intact. Our focus on positive and real relationships being the foundation for a safe and dynamic learning environment continues. Our belief in children as powerful, intelligent humans and our aim to support their whole-person development persists. We can enter this school year knowing that it will be different, yet temporary, yet an opportunity to grow.

High School

The most important thing about the high school class is that the teachers will be working to make these as engaging and include as much active learning as possible. Our young people miss school and learning alongside their peers. With many schools being virtual, we want to not only to engage with the youth in conversation, but also help them have fun while learning about their faith and the world around them. Some topics for this year include Mental Health, Systemic Racism, "what are my gifts and how can I use them to further glorify God," Stewardship, Prayer and different ways of praying, and last but definitely not least, being unconditionally loved by God.

This class will take place each Sunday at 12:30 p.m. in the Chapel Circle.

Middle School Curriculum

This year, our Middle School class (6th and 7th graders) learn more about the Old Testament in the fall and New Testament in the Spring. However, instead of meeting together each week, this will be an at-home curriculum using pop culture and media to teach each lesson. Once a month, we will have a gathering to discuss the learnings to help the 6th and 7th graders see that they are learning alongside, while remaining distant, a few other young people their age.

Confirmation

Each year, we invite our 8th graders to participate in the Confirmation Program. Through this class, they not only are able to learn more about the Reformed tradition and basic beliefs, but also are challenged to examine their own faith and relationship with God. They can choose at the end of Confirmation whether or not they are ready to make that public profession of faith that is required to become a member of the church. This class will also help them articulate their faith and give them words to be able to do so. Guided by adult mentors, the confirmand and adult mentor participate in a variety of ways in the church life so they are able to see different ministries at Second. These opportunities include ushering and greeting, serving at one of our mission partners, delivering home communion, and so much more.

Since we are still facing the challenges of CoVid19, we will not be meeting in September. We will continue to pray for one another and for all who are suffering in so many ways. Until we are able to gather again, we will share monthly lessons and scriptures through Second Thoughts. The 2020-21 Horizons Bible Study is "Into the Light: Finding Hope through Prayers of Lament" by P. Lynn Miller. The study explores "lament"

as a Biblical practice of looking to God for relief from worldly sorrows, sickness, injustice, and fears. Laments invoke God, describe grievances, and are often followed by hope through trust in God. In scripture, even God laments.

For Lesson 1, "The Heart of Lament", the scriptures are Psalm 22:1-31 and Matthew 27:45-56. In verses 1-19, the Psalmist prays for help. In verses 22-31, he praises God for helping. In the crucifixion story of Matthew, Jesus cries out to God. The quaking earth and opening tombs become signs to those watching over him that Jesus is the Son of God. As with Jesus through the resurrection, God is not lost to us.

A simple prayer for our study and for these challenging days is one that reminds us of God's eternal love. "The love of God enfolds me.

The light of God surrounds me. The power of God protects me. The presence of God watches over me. Wherever I am, God is."

In January 2020, the Mission Committee chartered a small task force to recommend how to serve more people in Louisville's African-American neighborhoods. The effort was in response to PC(USA)'s Matthew 25 initiative.

After research, the group determined food to be the foremost necessity among families in need, as well as an achievable mission. Discussions with Reverend Wayne Steele of Peace Presbyterian then led to an agreement to work with his congregation. Peace had

established a year earlier a monthly distribution of food and supplies to the neighborhood, and Rev. Steele had long wished for a second monthly distribution.

The Mission Committee on July 21, 2020, enthusiastically approved the plan and funds to begin the program. Funds initially covered the last half of 2020 for food, and for emergency needs of citizens. The first day of Second's assistance was August 10, 2020.

Along with mission funds, Second also provides vital volunteer support. When and where volunteers are needed: Distributions take place on the second and last Mondays of each month, starting at 8:00 a.m., when citizens arriving by car receive food in large boxes. Preparation occurs on the Fridays before those Mondays at 1:00 p.m. Volunteers from Peace and Second work several hours each day. All occurs at Peace Presbyterian Church, 4210

East Indian Trail, Louisville, KY 40213.

A rewarding part of this mission is building lasting relationships among brothers and sisters at both churches, working joyfully together in mutual, important mission.

An Observation & Accessibility



Hello from Kilgore! I wanted to jump in and connect with you, our friends at Second Presbyterian! I will briefly share an observation, remind you of our services, and update you on our accessibility. We have all been impacted by this virus and cultural tensions in one way or another, and while each of our circumstances is unique, there is also something we all have in common - the need to adjust and make meaning of what is happening. Part of what we do as clinicians is facilitate conversations that result in the making of new meaning and movement towards hope. Clearly, our clinicians do not

have all the answers, but hopefully the conversations we facilitate in each and every session result in new perspective, new skills, and new possibilities.

Lastly, how we have those conversations has changed a bit. Most of our conversations now take place via electronic means, what we commonly call "telehealth." While nothing can replace being present with each other, I am thankful for this technology and how it allows these important conversations to continue. In some instances it has actually opened up new opportunities. For example,

consider a couple needing marital help with a toddler or an infant. With no childcare available they would not be able to make it into the office. However, with telehealth we can come to them and tailor our services to their needs.

There are 150 families that presently receive Dare to Care food through the church. There are now an additional 75 families in need of food. The greatest needs are more fresh vegetables and meat. Also, Pastor Wayne requested a discretionary fund for so many with money problems related to Covid. The total cost was \$3650/month. Being urgent and greatly needed it was approved for six months to go through December for a cost of \$17,600. The money has been sent and the pick-up of food is under way outdoors at Peace Pres Church. We all know stewardship is about giving your time, talent, and wealth. From the latter aspect we can have great faith that God is looking down to say a job well done. **Now is a great time for all of us to go help sort the food, pack the boxes, mingle with our brothers and sister at Peace, and give our blessings to all those who come to pick up their food.**

Cabbage Patch-\$11,000.

Leave it to the Patch to make sure their students are never left behind. The Patch offers after school services but with no school learning suffers greatly. So they are starting their own Day School to make sure their studies contain. As you can imagine this is a huge endeavor costing a large amount of money. Their cost will be roughly \$11,000 a week for at least four weeks then hopefully can be lowered somewhat. Second will fund the first week of school.







At the August 13, 2020 stated session meeting held over Zoom:

- The Session received the Clerk's Report, the Minister's Report, the Deacons' Report, the Financial Report and various other monthly Committee Reports;
- Session approved a motion allowing Session and congregational meetings to be held electronically when necessary, retroactive to April 16, 2020;

- Lorie Williamson updated Session on the plans for fall educational programming at Second;
- The 2020 Church Nominating Committee will begin its work in September. Nominating committee members are Karen Hadley, Martha Nichols Pecceu, Cheeky Bahe, Kit Davis, Stuart Ferguson, Leigh Speiden and Susan Snyder, and they may be contacted with recommendations;
- The Mission Committee updated Session on Second's renewed relationship with Peace Presbyterian.
