

Dear Friends,

During my first year of seminary, I met someone who had a profound influence on my journey of faith. He was older than me, a former monk who had left the monastic life as he discerned a call to serve as a hospice chaplain, ministering to the dying and their families. He had a bushy, coal black beard, a smile on his face most of the time, and a joy about life that was infectious. He was a brilliant student and I envied his vast storehouse of knowledge.



One day I asked this wise disciple to share the most important truth he had learned throughout his journey. Without hesitation he said, "The only thing that lasts is relationship." I think he meant that the core of what it means to be human, our ultimate priority, is to tend to our relationship with God and others. Everything else is secondary. Our purpose is to receive with gratitude the grace, love, and acceptance that God offers us in Jesus Christ and to extend the same to all God's children.

His conviction has particular relevance in the time in which we are living. It is humbling to discover that, for some of us, it takes losing what we've known to fully appreciate the great gift of community. The pandemic, with its lockdowns and distancing, highlights the precious gift of, and our profound need for, physical closeness to and spontaneous signs of affection. Always being on guard takes its toll on us as relational beings. How I miss singing favorite hymns with you - without a mask and holding nothing back, even if off key!

We are facing serious challenges as a community of faith, as a city, and as a nation. Anxiety is the order of the day, carrying with it fear, defensiveness, and self-righteousness, all of which separate us even further from one another than we already are. Often, our anxious reaction is to make other things primary - political ideology, group identity, our particular worldview - and to invest ourselves wholeheartedly in that which doesn't last, in that which is secondary.

Christian faith and life are, at root, about the gift of a relationship that heals, makes whole, and brings abundance of life. It is about acceptance and favor offered to the undeserving, love lavished upon us as we are, not withheld until we're who we "ought" to be. "I am with you always, to the end of the age," promises Jesus. "Nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus," writes the apostle Paul. "The only thing that lasts is relationship," says my long-ago friend. In this age, and in every age, those are words to live by.

- Please do not participate if you have any symptoms, or are immunocompromised.



How Long?

Friends,

2020 seems as if it is a never-ending year of bad events happening one right after the other. On a recent trip driving to Rocky Mountain National Park (RMNP), we were hit with 90-degree weather and smoky air. The smoke was so bad that the beautiful mountains were barely visible hours away from the fires. It started raining ash when we were about two hours away; it looked like a peaceful snowfall. All day, in a city close by, the sky was dark and there was this beautifully radiant orange - like a sunset that filled the sky.

The fire closest to RMNP doubled in size in less than 24 hours, as we were driving toward it. It had spread from 40,000 to 100,000 acres making it the the fifth largest fire in Colorado history. That same night, after a day in the 90s, it started **snowing**. In the valley, it snowed about 7 or 8 inches...in early September!! This snowstorm was the talk of the town because of the hope it created. This precipitation not only helped the firefighters, but it also pushed the smoke out of the air making it safe for everyone to go outside again.

2020 has been kind of like that for a lot of people....a lot of waiting, watching Covid case numbers rise, and hoping to see a glimpse of the light at the end of what seems to be a never-ending tunnel. We are

all hoping for a theoretical snowfall that will just magically put out this fire that is Covid-19. How long, O Lord, before our country gets some relief? MLK Jr. asked the question "How long, O Lord?" during his sermons and speeches in reference to Psalm 13; the crowd present responded with "Not long!"

When the fire is finally extinguished, it will not be long, as little as 24 hours, before new life springs up from that which was destroyed by flames. And when society comes out on the other side of this huge disruption, it will not take long for us to create a new normal and find a new appreciation for old parts of our lives like going to school with no masks, going to concerts or movies, eating at restaurants.

We are a weary people who seem to be stuck in a never-ending cycle of receiving bad news, and we are tired. Where is God in the midst of all of it? Where is our snow? How long, O Lord, will it be before we see snow falling on the multiple fires (both literally and figuratively) in our country? As we wait for that snow to come, may you find peace in the knowledge that this too shall pass.

Greetings, Presbyterian Women of Second

Since we are still facing the challenges of Covid-19, we will not be meeting in October. We will continue to pray for one another and for healing and peace in our community and the world.

The Horizons Bible study "Into the Light" by P. Lynn Miller Lesson 2 "Lamenting Together" scriptures are Psalm 137 and Romans 12:4-5. In verses 1-4, the Psalmist's lament is communal for Israel's exile in Babylon, weeping as they remember Zion. Under the charge of their captors, they have no temple for worship and find no comfort from songs. In verses 5-7, the Psalmist moves to an individual lament remembering Jerusalem and promising faithfulness to God. Verses 8-9 suggest the desire for revenge coming from the Psalmist, not from God. The Israelites struggle to hold onto the life they had known and to keep their commitment to God while awaiting God's response to their sorrows. In Romans 12:4-5, Paul affirms our individual purpose and unique gifts which each of us contributes to the collective body of Christ. May we rejoice when one of us rejoices. And may we bear one another's burdens, when one of us laments.

The Peace-Second Partnership: We Want You!

Interested in hands-on assistance to people less fortunate? Please consider joining the Peace-Second Community Partnership team!

This is an important mission which Second generously assists – through mission funds as well as arms, legs and grateful spirits. We are fortunate to be embraced by and partnered in service with Peace Presbyterian, one of the four Black PC(USA) churches in town. As we together help people in need, especially with food, we also become acquainted with our gracious brothers and sisters at Peace.

How it began

In response to PC(USA)'s Matthew 25 initiative, the program began in January, when our Mission Committee chartered a small task force to recommend how to serve more people in Louisville's Black neighborhoods. The group, comprised of Jodie Goldberg, Karen Hadley, and Sue Rogers, determined that food was the foremost necessity and an achievable mission.

During their research period, Rev. Wayne Steele, pastor of Peace Presbyterian, said he hoped to expand Peace's food program, established a year earlier. Volunteers at Peace joined discussions, as did District 2 Metro Councilwoman Barbara Shanklin, who arranged Dare to Care cooperation. Then our Mission Committee agreed to double Peace's distributions,

from once to twice a month. The funds may go toward other areas, too, as Rev. Steele sees community needs.

The work

Through September we have now participated in three distributions, which occur on two Mondays each month at Peace, 4210 East Indian Trail. Cars line up in the Peace parking lot, and about 75 families (150-250 people) receive boxes of fresh vegetables, canned food, frozen meat, and packaged goods. Three zip codes are served: 40213, 40218, and 40219.

Peace's volunteers are organized, efficient and number between 10 and 15. We supplement Peace's group with five volunteers on Monday mornings, and with three helpers on Friday afternoons to prepare the boxes.

Our students miss school, and we miss them

We are working as hard as we can to support our young men. We know our school makes a difference, our results speak for themselves.

Of our 62 8th grade alumni:

- 100% of the 2020 class have accepted full private High School scholarships
- 31 alumni are currently attending High School
- 29 are already High School Graduates
- 15 are currently attending College
- 3 are College Graduates
- 2 are serving in the Military

When Robert and Debbie Blair started our school 15 years ago, it was a social experiment with three students. This experiment is clearly making a positive impact on our students, their families, and the communities they live in.

We are able to help these students succeed in large part through support from people like you. This support allows us to provide:

- An education to 145 students who attend the school.
- Boarding for 10 high school students during their high school education (during normal times).
- Free or reduced lunch. All of our students are eligible for this support.

As we start our first full week of classes, please consider making a gift to West End School to ensure our young men have all of the resources possible during these challenging times.






Book Notes
