While our teachers enjoy their summer break, we want to acknowledge the ways they let children know they belong and are valued at 2nd Pres Weekday School. The infant garden is one recent example. Our youngest students worked together to create a garden for their playground at their developmental level. They dug holes for plants with small shovels and scoops, spread out the dirt with hand rakes, and painted rocks to create a decorative border. The garden remained open for transformation after the initial build. The hand rakes, rocks, and shovels were left available so the children could continue engaging with the dynamic space through the end of the school year. The infant teachers also used their knowledge of child development and observation to notice the type of work, play and exploration their students were interested in to design the project. Their belief in their young students' capabilities allowed for a project the children could complete almost entirely on their own. Now, there is a garden on our campus built by children, a mark of their beautiful classroom community and the common goal they worked together to achieve.

On April 23, members of Pathways (sponsored by the Mission Committee) teamed up with Love the Hungry to help assemble 12,744 meal kits to ship to Ukrainian refugees near the border of Ukraine. It took less than 2 hours. The following morning, Pathways decided to continue with this endeavor by passing the hat during their class until they have enough money to participate again, the cost is \$500. The class also discussed extending this offer to other Sunday School classes and groups (youth, choir, women's and men's group).

Love the Hungry currently has 3 primary destination requests: Haiti, Central America (Guatemala), and South Sudan. They also supply meal kits to about 29 other countries, including the USA, based on need and logistic abilities to get the kits delivered. Love the Hungry partners with a variety of faith and civic organizations to assemble the fortified meal kits.

Refugee updates

Ukrainian Refugees

According to the United Nations, over 1 million people have fled Ukraine since the Russian invasion. Ukrainians are fleeing to neighboring countries, including Poland, Hungary, Moldova, Slovakia, Romania, Russia, and Belarus. This BBC story details how people are fleeing and what aid they are receiving. (adapted from the KRM newsletter, 2022)

Many community members have contacted KRM (KY Refugee Ministries) to ask if we are welcoming Ukrainian refugees. At this time, KRM and their national partners do not know when any Ukrainian refugees would be arriving in the U.S. or Kentucky. People fleeing Ukraine would have to go through a refugee application in order to travel to Kentucky through the United States resettlement program. If Ukrainian refugees were to be resettled in the United States, KRM and other organizations working as part of the U.S. refugee program would willingly welcome them, as they do all refugees admitted to the U.S. in need of protection and an opportunity to rebuild their lives. At Second, the mission committee is ready to welcome any family, whether they are from the Ukraine or elsewhere in the world.

About KRM and Us

Chris Ellis was invited to present on the Mission Committee's refugee resettlement work at a conference in March organized by Church World Service. Read on for Chris's great overview of the refugee resettlement process though KRM and their partnership with co-sponsors.

KRM provides a wide range of professional resettlement services to refugees and immigrants, offering stability and a sense of belonging to these future American citizens. An outstanding staff of caseworkers, interpreters, attorneys, teachers, and others work to facilitate their transition to our community. While some co-sponsors are civic or business groups, the majority are faith-based groups.

At the local level, KRM has welcomed 108 refugees in Louisville, 77 refugees in Lexington, and four refugees in Northern Kentucky this program year, from October 1 through mid-February.

Refugees come from many different situations:

- 1. Seeking asylum
- 2. Fleeing from violence, hunger, climate change, political events, etc.
- 3. Initiating requests for resettlement in other countries through legal means through their own state departments.

All refugees and immigrants to the US are approved and vetted by our State Department. They are then directed to Church World Service which sends them to resettlement agencies throughout the country.

Immigrants arriving in Louisville are received by Kentucky Refugee Ministries or Catholic Services. These agencies in turn find faith communities, civic organizations, businesses or individuals who are willing to co-sponsor.

Our Mission Committee and refugee team take it one family at a time. Financially, we offer rental assistance for the first three months of the sponsorship. Self-sufficiency is the goal! Second's congregation offers aid in many ways to the families, based on their needs. We are grateful for this congregation's ongoing support and participation as we share the grace of God with all those around us.

Session Highlights

From the May 12, 2022 session meeting:

• The Chapel Organ Committee is working alongside the Worship Committee and the Music Committee to address replacement of the chapel organ.

• Financial Report Highlights: Pledge Comparison Sheet: Pledges for 2022 received in April were \$140k bringing total YTD 2022 pledge income received to \$622k including 1) pre-paid 2022 pledges at year end 2021 (\$149k) and 2) 2021 pledges not paid until 2022 (\$59k). This is ahead of the 2022 MAP (Ministry Action Plan) and the same period in 2021. Treasurer's Report Highlights: YTD Activity through 4/30/22: YTD income is \$60,872 more than same period 2021, YTD expenses are \$33,582 more than the same period 2021. Actual activity is tracking well with MAP. Balance Sheet Highlights: Net of restricted funds, cash of \$142,299 is sufficient to cover about a month of budgeted expenses.

• Associate Pastor Nominating Committee has been working to complete the forms required by the Presbytery. The MIF (Ministry Information Form) is completed and has been submitted to Presbytery. The committee will be advertising soon and hopefully will begin receiving resumes.

• The Taiwanese Presbyterian fellowship with Second Presbyterian is nearing completion. A draft property use agreement is being prepared for review by the Property Committee as well as an attorney. The Taiwanese Presbyterian Church fellowship with Second is set to begin later in June.
