A recent article in the Courier-Journal addressed why so many Americans have stopped attending church and referenced surveys done to determine the reasons. Among the more significant reasons were "widespread child abuse in the Catholic Church, use of the Bible to score political points and the too-frequent requests for money."

That last reason got my attention because it is "stewardship season." It is traditional during October and November to focus on securing financial support for the church and its mission during the following calendar year. After several weeks of testimony and correspondence comes Dedication Sunday – this year November 12 – on which we make a public commitment to fund the ministries of this church by coming forward to drop our pledge or commitment card in the basket. After Dedication Sunday, with the exception of a few reports and reminders, that's it for financial stewardship.

Traditionally we have relied upon pledges – upfront commitments to give a certain amount of money during the year – to fund ministry. Yet the number of pledgers at Second has declined over the years. Giving has stayed steady mainly because of the increased and generous giving of older adults, many of whom are well into their 80's. At the same time non-pledged giving has increased, already doubling in 2023 what was given in all of 2022.

Going forward I believe financial stewardship will need to be a more frequent topic. I know that in some churches there are seemingly unrelenting "asks." I also know that for many of us it is deeply uncomfortable to discuss money and faith, even branding it inappropriate. Yet Jesus spoke more about money and faith than anything other than the Kingdom of God. Why? Because attitudes about and use of money are strong indicators of what we value and who or what we trust.

Do you value what Second Presbyterian offers and stands for? Do you value a community of friendships, quality music and worship, formation ministries for you, your children and your youth, people who care and support you in hard times, knowing you have a place to say goodbye to a loved one, celebrate a wedding or a baptism, hear "good news" (the gospel) that you won't hear anywhere else, take part in service to others, wrestle with the issues of the day from a faith perspective?

Our Presbyterian tradition says the heart of the Christian life is a grateful response to the myriad graces of God in our lives. Take a few moments and consider how God's grace touches you through the life and mission of this congregation and respond with a grateful heart. The use of our money and other resources for God's purposes can be a joyful, moving, and profoundly spiritual experience. Let's talk about it!

Zooming In: How Documentation Helps Us Connect More Closely with Children Hayley Abell, Director


A magical moment happened in our older toddler classroom when a child became interested in my pencil and the document on which I had been recording notes. She sat on the floor and began making marks on my paper. A few peers nearby noticed her focused attention. They watched her move the pencil rapidly from one side of the paper to the other, bending over to get closer and closer to her marks. Some children wished to use the pencil themselves while others commented on what she was doing: "Pencil...drawing...oh, circles!" An excited energy developed among several children. The teachers quickly offered pencils, pens, markers, pieces of drawing paper, and sticky notes at a table. Children immediately swarmed the table, feverishly generating marks. They researched the relationship between their movements and the marks which appeared on their paper: staccato dots, long pulls of lines, tight zigzags, and loopy circles. This



buzzing exploration gently ended after about ten minutes when it was time to transition outside to play.

This short story of the toddler room's interest in mark making was thrilling to watch in real time. One child's initial curiosity and engagement with new materials quickly unfolded into a dynamic group interest. What comes next is up to the teachers. They can utilize the documentation gathered during this mark making experience to hypothesize what felt important to the children and how to further support this emergent inquiry in the following days and weeks.

Documentation can come in many forms: anecdotal notes, photographs, video and audio recordings,




fully when we review documentation and discuss with our teaching partners and teams. This is based on the pedagogical approach from Reggio Emilia, Italy, our greatest educational influence. As one Reggio Emilia educator, Sara De Poi, said: "Never underestimate children's processes nor consider a scribble just a scribble."

So, as the toddler teachers carefully comb through the pile of sticky notes and drawing paper, the photographs, and the short video segment, they can start to meet up with their children's minds and intentionally offer open-ended avenues for further investigation of mark making. Through this process, they respectfully plan curriculum specific to this group of children and embark on a new learning adventure with them.

Second Receives Award from Shively Area Ministries







More and more people in Louisville need some sort of assistance, financial or otherwise, in order to keep their lights on, water flowing, food in their bellies, and their rent paid. The Association of Community Ministries in Louisville works tirelessly to combat these issues and more.

Shively Area Ministries (SAM), one of Second's mission partners, serves nearly 14,000 people in such circumstances, and has prevented evictions for nearly one person daily in its neighborhood of zip code 40216. At the last annual count, SAM kept utilities turned on for 2,150 people -- six people a day, fed over 6,100 households, and delivered 4,500 meals via Meals on Wheels. SAM also helps with transportation costs, medical needs, and social service references.

Second has helped this community ministry with funding and provided volunteers for about three years. Jodie Goldberg, Janet Rittenhouse, and Terry Cissell have made many Meals on Wheels runs over the course of months. The personal contact and relationships established have been important to the homebound receiving the deliveries of food.

Jodie has maintained a library open to the public, with books taken for free. The children's books that Second's congregants have provided fly off the shelves. It has been rewarding to know that children are actually reading or being read to.

This combination of volunteerism and funds was recognized on September 28 by SAM's executives at its annual fundraising dinner event.

Presbyterian Theological Seminary

The Rev. Dr. Pomerville was the Assistant Vice President for community and the founding director of the Center for College and Community Engagement at Alma College. He was also the college's Senior Chaplain. At Alma College, he co-led efforts to raise \$2 million to renovate the historic chapel.



He was ordained in the PC (USA) 2007. He served at the Church in the Hills (Bellaire, MI) where he created a community youth center and established a monthly free meal within the county. He was head of staff for The People's Church of East Lansing. While at the People's Church, Pomerville started new ministries that focused on ecumenical partnerships, racial justice and active involvement in city and state planning. He also served as Chaplain for the Police Department in Lansing.

The Rev. Dr. Pomerville was named one of ten Church Financial Leadership Coaches. He was awarded the Executive Certificate for Religious Fundraising from the Lake Institute for Religious Fundraising. He has been a champion for antiracism policies and LGBTQIA+ affirming practices in education and in the church.

He received a Bachelor's degree in history from Alma College, a Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary and a Doctor of Ministry from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary/University of Aberdeen, Scotland. He holds a certificate in Adaptive Leadership from Michigan State University's College of Business.

What is it about the experience of giving and receiving thanks that makes it so powerful? From what I could find the word's origins are Old English and Germanic and include sentiments such as favor, grace, pleasure, satisfaction, good will, and simply thought. We typically thank someone for doing something for us or they thank us for doing something for them which gives it a transactional quality. In addition to a transaction what if we added an existential quality. How often do you thank someone for being who they are? I know I don't do it enough, but I think it can be such a powerful way to validate each other. Ok, so since I'm a therapist I must ask, how would you feel if someone thanked you for being you? What would that really mean to you?

A big part of what we do in counseling/therapy is get to know and thank people for who they are because it is usually those very qualities that get them through whatever they are going through.
